### Helping children with their reading - volunteers wanted!



## Community Links - a visit from our MP

On Monday 28th November, our local member of parliament, Rachel Hopkins, visited the school to meet the pupils and explain what MPs do. This was linked to November's *Parliament Week*.

### Answering School Council's questions

In assembly, Ms Hopkins answered questions from our school councillors. They had prepared their questions in advance, asking Ms Hopkins how she got interested in politics as a young person, what she did as an MP at the House of Commons and what she has done for Luton. She gave detailed answers about how she works with other MPs, including those from other parties, to secure improvements for the local area. Some children also raised issues about some problem areas in the local environment and, following her visit, Ms Hopkins has worked with local councillors to get those areas improved.



### Touring the School



After the assembly, our head girl and head boy gave Ms Hopkins a tour of the school so that she could visit the classes and see them at work.

In a letter she sent after the visit, Ms Hopkins commented on how much she enjoyed the tour and speaking to the pupils. She said that the School Council had some very interesting and thoughtful questions and she was pleased to see the pupils engaged in democracy and participation.

In a termly *house forum*, children work together with others from their house rather than their class, including children from a different year group. 


