## Getting ready

In the hall, Mrs Healey and Mrs Fisher created an exhibition of photos and memorabilia from the last fifty years. Artefacts included the original school register, along with a tie worn on the first day and exercise books from one of the first pupils. Outside, numerous stall holders had set up games or sales tables.



## Special commemorations

The event opening was marked by Rachel Hopkins MP raising our special flag, accompanied by our head boy and head girl. We also opened our Gabrys Golden Garden. This vegetable garden has been developed by our Eco Committee this year and was funded by the Co-op. It has been named after Mr Gabrys who sadly died in service as head teacher of Someries Juniors in 2001. The garden was opened by his widow, Mrs Margaret Gabrys, who cut the golden ribbon.



## Enjoying the event

There was a very large crowd enjoying the activities both on the field and in the school hall - as well as large numbers on school tours to see how the school has changed since their own Someries days. Outside, we were entertained with a range of performances. Former pupil Teona played a set on the saxophone and ex-head girl Kristija sang on stage. # Highlights from June & July

## Trips

This term has seen a great variety of trips for children in different classes. Here are a few highlights.

### St Albans Cathedral

Year 3 started this half term with a visit to St Albans Cathedral where they learned about the Romans and acted out the martyrdom of St Alban. They also made their own mosaic to bring back with them.



### RAF Hendon and a World War II education

Year 5 have been learning about World War II in History lessons and they went to the RAF museum at Hendon to view aircraft from that period. As well as military aircraft, they learned about the history of flight.



They also experienced a 1940's style classroom, with lift up desks with ink pots. There, they were taught by a strict teacher and had to take cover under the tables when the air raid siren sounded.



## Making Pizza at Putteridge School

Both Year 6 classes had lessons in the Food Technology room in Putteridge High School where they created and baked individual pizzas. They brought home their pizzas in the boxes they had designed.



## Visit to Guru Nanak Gurdwara

To support their learning about Sikhism in RE, Year 4 classes visited the new Guru Nanak Gurdwara.



## Barton Springs

To support their learning about rivers in Geography, Year 5 classes went on a field trip to Barton Springs.



## Kidzania

On 22<sup>nd</sup> June, Year 6 headed to London where they spent the day at 'Kidzania' a mini-town where children could earn Kidzo credits by working in a range of jobs, from cleaning and deliveries to surgery and firefighting. This experience was aimed at introducing the children to a variety of careers. At the end of their day's work, they could spend the Kidzos that they had earned at the shop.



## Willen Lake

To introduce them to a variety of water sports and to help their confidence in open water, Year 6 children had a day on the lake taking part in paddle boarding, raft making and 'katakanuing'.
